The Bill

H.R. 2424 — Sponsored by Representative Albio Sires (NJ-8), and cosponsored by eleven other representatives — was introduced on June 18, 2013. It was referred to the Committee on Public Lands and Environmental Regulation. The Issues

- Many American communities suffer from a lack of green space, dilapidated and outdated facilities, unsafe playgrounds, and inadequate access to recreation resources.¹
- Childhood obesity has tripled in the last thirty years, and more than 75 percent of American adults are classified as regularly sedentary — a leading cause of obesity and chronic disease.²
- A community without fully functional park systems is less able to create jobs, stimulate growth, and attract business investment, a highly skilled workforce, and tourism dollars.³

Solutions in This Bill

The Community Parks Revitalization Act will provide matching federal grants for much needed parks and recreation infrastructure. Specifically, the bill would authorize the Department of Housing and Urban Development to:

- Create a federal program that provides localities with competitive loans, loan guarantees, and lines of credit for construction or the capital costs of large scale parks and recreation projects.
- Administer grants to assist localities in rebuilding, remodeling, expanding, or developing existing or new recreational areas and facilities.
- Provide matching grants for innovative programming, with an emphasis on at-risk youth, returning veterans, and military families.

By providing grants and innovative financing for local parks and recreation, Congress has the opportunity to spur economic growth and abate the public health crisis at the local community level.

Data Points

- Access to quality parks and recreation opportunities positively impacts public health and provides for cost-effective and non-regulatory means of addressing environmental and conservation concerns.⁴
- More than four out of every five Americans lives in an urban or metropolitan area.⁵
- More than thirty studies have shown that parks and green space positively affect property values for adjacent properties by as much as 25 percent, increase local tax revenues, and attract tourism dollars.⁶
- Publications such as *Forbes, Business Week,* and the *Wall Street Journal* consistently cite the presence of quality parks and recreation resources as key criteria in listing the best cities for businesses, jobs, and places to live.
- The Urban Parks and Recreation Recovery Program (UPARR) a program of the federal government designed to provide matching grants to localities in economically distressed communities — has not been funded since 2002.⁷

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- Outdoor recreation contributes \$646 billion to the U.S. economy, supports 6.1 million direct jobs, and generates \$80 billion in federal, state, and local tax revenue — each year.⁸
- A 2007 study in Philadelphia shows that the city's park system contributed nearly \$7.5 million in savings for storm water treatment and air pollution mitigation.⁹
