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INTRODUCTION

BACKGROUND

The American Camp Association (ACA) Research Team supports and facilitates rigorous research to expand the value and visibility of the camp experience and provide research-informed resources for camps. This includes survey research related to camp business, operations, programs, and trends. Prior to 2020, ACA's business research program was divided into three distinct, rotating reports: a business operations report (distributed in 2018, 2015, and 2011); a sites, facilities, & programs report (distributed in 2020, 2017, and 2014); and a staffing, compensation, & benefits report (distributed in 2018, 2016, 2013, and 2010). These reports were comprised of data collected from ACA member camps across the nation, representing all five ACA regions. Beginning in 2020, these distinct efforts were combined into a single research survey report, CampCounts, to be carried forward into future years. Furthermore, non-ACA members were invited to participate for the first time. In 2021, ACA collaborated with YMCA of the USA (Y-USA) to combine and streamline the annual business survey efforts for both organizations.

The purpose of the CampCounts survey is to support camp professionals in their operational decision-making and to support ACA's advocacy efforts. Responses are anonymous and reported in aggregate by the following segments: primary program type (day and overnight), business model, budget size, and region. This report details findings from CampCounts 2021. Results are compared to CampCounts 2020 and other previous ACA business reports (now combined into CampCounts) where possible.

METHODS

Population

The primary contacts for ACA member camps and YMCA member camps were invited to participate in this study via direct email. Camps not in ACA's direct email list were later invited to participate via an anonymous link in both the ACA's and Y-USA's online newsletters. Respondents were asked to ensure only one representative from their camp completed the survey such that each response represents a single camp.

Online Survey

The 94-item survey was distributed via Qualtrics survey software. Branching logic was used to customize the survey so that respondents only answered questions that were relevant to their summer 2021 operational status (operated day camp programs and/or operated overnight camp programs). YMCA camps also received a customized set of questions. Given this structure, respondents did not complete all 94 items. Average time to completion was 1464 minutes; Median time to completion was 124 minutes. The survey was launched via email invitation on October 11, 2021, with a planned survey close of October 22, 2021. Due to a low response rate, the survey deadline was extended and promoted via an anonymous link. The survey closed on October 29, 2021, and all responses (including partial responses) were recorded on November 3, 2021.

Response

A total of 2333 emails were sent. From these, 348 surveys were started, and 178 responses were completed, resulting in a 51-percent completion rate and a 7.6-percent response rate. A total of 32 responses were completed from the anonymous link promoted through ACA's and Y-USA's online newsletters.

Cleaning

Screening procedures were employed to clean the data prior to analyzing it. Responses were removed if they responded to less than 10 percent of relevant items, resulting in 210 usable responses that were included in the analysis. Items were analyzed on a per-item basis, meaning the results represent a different number of responses. The number of responses analyzed for each item is indicated as *N*= throughout the report.

Reporting

Results are reported according to the segments described in the table below. We compared the response segments to ACA membership, which, at the time of this report, was just shy of 3,000 camps in the US. While ACA membership is one snapshot of camps in the US, we believe it only represents about 20 percent of all camps in the country, and it is likely the camps that are ACA members and/or are accredited may not represent the full distribution of camps. This is particularly relevant regarding business model, given the collaboration on this survey with Y-USA and thus, the potential overrepresentation of YMCA-affiliated camps within the present sample.

FINDINGS

CAMP PROFILE

Most of the camps responding to the CampCounts 2021 survey were ACA accredited (see Figure 1). More specifically, 84 percent reported being ACA accredited, 14 percent reported not being ACA accredited, and only 2 percent reported not knowing if their camp was ACA accredited. Table 2 details ACA accreditation by segments. Camps offering any amount of overnight camp programs and other alternative camp programs were more likely to be ACA accredited than camps offering any amount of day camp programs. Camps offering primarily (50 percent or more) overnight camp programs had the highest rate of ACA accreditation among the primary programming segments, and for-profit and municipal/government-affiliated camps had the highest rate of ACA accreditation among the camp owner/sponsor segments.


When asked about programming in a typical year, just over half of all camps responding to the survey reported offering at least some day camp programming, and nearly three quarters of all camps reported offering at least some overnight camp programming (see Figure 2). About half of the camps reported offering some counselor-in-training/junior counselor programming or groups/retreats/conferences/rentals programming in a typical year. More than a third of the camps reported offering some family camp programming, and more than a quarter of the camps reported offering some outdoor education programming in a typical year. Around 10 percent of the camps reported offering specialized camps for people with diverse abilities or some other type of camp programming in a typical year. These findings are broken down by segments in Table 3.

When asked about programming in 2021, overnight camp was the most reported programming type, with two-thirds of camps reporting offering at least some (if not mostly or all) overnight camp programming (see Figure 3). This was followed by 56 percent of camps reporting offering at least some day camp programming, and 48 percent of camps reporting offering at least some counselor-in-training/junior counselor programming. The next most prevalent programming types, in order, were groups/retreats/conferences/rentals, family camp, outdoor education, other alternative programming types, followed by specialized camps for people with diverse abilities. These findings are broken down by segments in Table 4.





CAMP PROGRAMS

Of the 210 camps responding to the CampCounts 2021 survey, 60 percent reported offering in-person programming the prior year in Summer 2020 (see Figure 4). Reported daily perperson fees varied substantially by program category as well as by segment (see Table 6). Among the primary program type segments (day camp, overnight camp, or other alternative programming), the lowest average daily per-person fee was reported by camps that primarily offer some other type of camp programming besides day or overnight camp and was for their outdoor education programs (\$24.33). The highest average daily per-person fee among the primary program type segments was reported by overnight camps for overnight camp programs (\$448.53).

Spotlight on Daily Per-Person Fees According to Primary Programming Type

Compared to previous years, average daily per-person fees for both day and overnight camp programs saw a sharp increase in 2021 among both camps that primarily offer day camp programs and those that primarily offer overnight camp programs. When asked to identify the primary reason for fee increases from 2019 to 2020, the commonly reported response was "increased cost of inputs (e.g., COVID-related supplies or other program supplies)" followed by "to cover increased cost of living." Respondents to CampCounts 2021 were not asked to identify the primary reason for fee increases from 2020 to 2021, however, given the ongoing impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic throughout 2021, as well as the increased cost of living from 2020 to 2021¹, it is possible that these factors remained impactful for camps when determining their 2021 daily per-person fees.

When segmented according to camp owner/sponsor, the lowest average daily per-person fee was reported by for-profit camps for outdoor education programs (\$29.25), and the highest average daily person fee was reported by nonprofit camps affiliated with another agency for their overnight camp programs (\$500.08). Looking ahead to 2022, 84 percent of all the camps responding to this survey reported anticipating their fees would increase from 2021 to 2022 (see Figure 5). The most commonly anticipated fee increase was from 3 percent to 5 percent.

Spotlight on Daily Per-Person Fees According to Camp Owner/Sponsor

Compared to previous years, the average daily per-person fee for day camp rose significantly among nonprofit camps, both independent and affiliated (149.5 percent and 198.4 percent, respectively). Overnight camp fees at independent nonprofit camps saw a much milder increase of 5.3 percent from 2020 to 2021, whereas overnight camps fees at nonprofit camps affiliated with another agency rose 414 percent overall. While for-profit camps also saw a substantial increase in daily per-person fees for both day (42.3 percent) and overnight (23.4 percent) camp programs, the increases were much less dramatic, compared to those reflected in the nonprofit camp segments.



When asked about session lengths offered, the most commonly reported session length for both day and overnight camp sessions was one week (five to seven days; see Figure 6). Furthermore, regardless of the program types offered by a camp, the primary program type of a camp, or the camp owner/sponsor, weeklong day and overnight camps (five to seven days in length) served the most unique campers (see Tables 8 and 9). More specifically, camps offering 50 percent or more day camp programming served the most unique day camp campers, on average, per weeklong session (854.47). Although camps offering 50 percent or more day camp programming also reported the most unique overnight camp campers, on average, per weeklong session (884), this is based on a total of three camps. Therefore, the average number of unique overnight campers reported by camps offering 50 percent or more overnight camp programming (532.96) is likely a more accurate representation of the highest average number of unique overnight campers according to the primary program type segment.

Figure 4 2020 In-person programming (full sample, N=210)







CAMP STAFF

Of the camps responding to this survey, camps that ran *any amount* of day programming employed the most day camp employees, on average (59.6 people), compared to camps that ran any amount of overnight programming or some amount of alternative programming (see Table 10). Similarly, camps that *primarily* ran day camp programming (50 percent or more of their total program offerings) employed more day camp employees, on average, than camps that primarily ran overnight camp or alternative camp programming (90.98 people on average, compared to 16.21 and 19.29, respectively). When segmented according to camp owner/sponsor, for-profit camps employed the largest number of day camp employees (145.94, on average), and government camps employed the smallest number of day camp employees (17, on average). Table 10 further details day camp employees by full time exempt / full time nonexempt / part-time status, seasonal / temporary status, international status, and volunteer status, according to programming and camp owner/sponsor segments.

Shifting to consider overnight camp employees, camps offering *any* amount of alternative programming employed the most overnight camp employees, on average (82.21), compared to camps that ran some amount of day camp programming or some amount of overnight programming (see Table 11). Meanwhile, camps that *primarily* ran overnight camp programs employed more overnight camp employees, on average, than camps that primarily ran day camp or alternative camp programming (87.16 people, on average, compared to 37.50 and 50.52, respectively). When segmented according to camp owner/sponsor, for-profit camps once again employed the largest number of overnight camp employees (117.96, on average). Table 11 further details overnight camp employees by full time exempt / full time

Spotlight on International Staff

In response to the challenges of the COVID-19 global pandemic, the U.S. Department of State temporarily suspended routine visa services at all US Embassies and Consulates, resulting in significantly fewer international summer camp staff members in 2020. While not back to pre-pandemic levels, the number of international summer camp staff members rose substantially in 2021, with 9% of day camps reporting having at least one international staff member (up from 5% in 2020), and 47% of overnight camps reporting having at least one international staff member (up from 13% in 2020).

nonexempt / part-time status, seasonal / temporary status, international status, and volunteer status, according to programming and camp owner/sponsor segments.

Overall, 75 percent of camps that ran some amount of day camp programming and 61 percent of camps that ran some amount of overnight camp programming reported that at least some of their camp staff in 2021 were also camp staff in the previous summer (see Figure 7). When asked about staffing needs, 59 percent of camps that ran some amount of day camp programming and half the camps that ran some amount of overnight camp programming reported being able to meet their summer camp staffing needs in 2021 (see Figure 8). Meanwhile, one-third of camps offering some amount of day camp programming and 43 percent of camps offering some amount of overnight camp programming reported that they were not able to meet their staffing needs because there were not enough qualified staffers. Of the camps that were not able to meet their staffing needs because there were not enough qualified staffers, the most commonly reported number of additional staffers desired was between one and five additional staffers for camps offering some amount of day camp programming, and between six and ten additional staffers for camps offering some amount of overnight camp programming (see Figure 9).





Figure 11 Overnight camp staff resignations (full sample, N=136)

When asked about early staff resignations, 56 percent of the camps responding to this survey that offered some amount of day camp programming reported having day camp staff resign in advance of their contracted end date (see Figure 10), and 71 percent of the camps that offered some amount of overnight camp programming reported having overnight camp staff resign in advance of their contracted end date (see Figure 11).




Figure 12 Percent of Staff Resignations

Of the camps that reported having staff resign in advance of their contracted end date, more than half reported that less than 5 percent of their staff resigned in advance of their contracted end date (see Figure 12). The next most commonly reported percentage of summer camp staff to resign in advance of their contracted end date was 5–10 percent.






Figure 13 Staff wage changes from 2020 (full sample)

Regarding day camp staff wages, with the exception of camps offering any amount of overnight camp programming and for-profit camps, the most commonly reported full-time, seasonal day camp position was counselor. Among camps that primarily offered day camp programming, the mean gross weekly wage of counselors was \$656.06, and the median gross weekly wage was \$440 (see Table 12). Descriptive statistics (minimum, maximum, mean, median, and count) for gross weekly wages of summer day camp full-time, seasonal positions are detailed in Table 12. Regarding overnight camp staff wages, counselors were again the most commonly reported full-time seasonal overnight camp position, with a mean gross weekly wage of \$439.99 among camps that primarily offered overnight camp programming, and a median gross weekly wage of \$275 (see Table 13). Descriptive statistics (minimum maximum, mean, median, and count) for gross weekly wages of

summer overnight camp full-time seasonal positions are detailed in Table 13. Note that the median may be considered a more stable measure of central tendency for the salary/wage reporting detailed in this section of the report. More than half of the camps responding to this survey that offered some amount of day or overnight camp programming reported that staff wages increased from 2020 to 2021 (see Figure 13).




Figure 15 Overnight camp employees by gender, mean summary (full sample, N=136)




Figure 17 Overnight camp employees by age, mean summary (full sample, N=136)




Figure 19 Overnight camp employees by race/ethnicity, mean summary (full sample, N=136)

When asked about employee demographics, summer day camp staff in 2021 were most likely to be female (63 percent, on average; see Figure 14 and Table 16), 18–20 years old (38 percent on average, see Figure 16 and Table 18), and Caucasian or White (54 percent on average; see Figure 18 and Table 20). Similarly, overnight camp staff in 2021 were also most likely to be female (58 percent on average, see Figure 15 and Table 17), 18–20 years old (50 percent on average; see Figure 17 and Table 19), and Caucasian or White (72 percent on average; see Figure 19 and Table 21). Mean percentages of both day and overnight camp employees by gender, age, and race/ethnicity are broken down by segments in Tables 16 through 21.


Spotlight on Day Camp Staff Demographics

As with previous years, camps responding to the CampCounts 2021 survey indicated employing a variety of day camp staff members. Compared to 2018, on average, camps reported employing more day staff identifying as male along with staff identifying as neither male nor female. While camps reported fewer Black or African-American day camp employees as well as fewer Hispanic/Latino day camp employees in 2021 compared to 2018, they also reported fewer Caucasian or White day camp employees and considerably more day camp employees of other races and ethnicities, suggesting an overall increase in the racial and ethnic diversity among day camp staff.



Spotlight on Overnight Camp Staff Demographics

Like the day camp staff trends reported above, on average, camps reported employing more overnight staff identifying as male along with staff identifying as neither male nor female in 2021 compared to 2018. Camps again reported fewer Black or African-American overnight camp employees as well as fewer Caucasian or White overnight camp employees, on average, in 2021 compared to 2018. The average number of Hispanic/Latino overnight camp employees remained at 5 percent, and the percentage of overnight camp employees of other races and ethnicities increased considerably, again suggesting an overall increase in the racial and ethnic diversity among overnight camp staff.







Figure 10 Day camp staff resignations (full sample, N=112)

Figure 14 Day camp employees by gender, mean summary (full sample, N=113)





Figure 18 Day camp employees by race/ethnicity, mean summary (full sample, N=113)



CAMP PARTICIPANTS

Regardless of whether a camp offered any amount of day camp programming, any amount of overnight camp programming, or any amount of alternative programming, the camps responding to this survey, on average, served the most unique/unplacated campers through groups/retreats/conferences/rental programs all year in 2021, including summer (see Table 22). Segmented according to primary programming type, day camps and camps primarily offering some alternative type of programming served the most unique/unduplicated campers through group/retreats/conferences/rental programs, and overnight camps served the most unique/unduplicated campers through outdoor education programs. Segmented according to camp owner/sponsor, unaffiliated nonprofit camps and for-profit camps served the most unique/unduplicated campers, on average, all year in 2021 through outdoor education programs, while nonprofit camps affiliated with another entity served the most unique/unduplicated campers, on average, all year in 2021 through groups/retreats/conferences/rental programs.

Looking at campers served during summer 2021 only, overnight camp programs and groups/retreats/conferences/rental programs most often served the most unique/unduplicated campers, on average (see Table 23). Segmented according to primary programming type, day camps and camps primarily offering some alternative type of programming served the most unique/unduplicated summertime campers, on average, through group/retreats/conferences/rental programs, and overnight camps served the most unique/unduplicated summertime campers, on average, through overnight camp programs. Segmented according to camp owner/sponsor, unaffiliated nonprofit camps and for-profit camps served the most unique/unduplicated summertime campers, on average, through groups/retreats/conferences/rental programs, while nonprofit camps affiliated with another entity served the most unique/unduplicated summertime campers, on average, through overnight camp programs.

Spotlight on Unique Campers Served

While 2020 saw a dramatic decrease in the average number of unique campers served at both day and overnight camps due to the COVID-19 global pandemic, 2021 offered a spark of hope for the overall camp industry. Though day camps, on average, did not reach their pre-pandemic number of unique campers served, they still saw a 96-percent increase in the average number of unique campers served. Overnight camps, on the other hand, surpassed pre-pandemic averages for unique campers served, with a 64-percent increase in unique campers served, on average, compared to 2020, and a 22-percent increase in unique campers served, on average, compared to 2019.




Figure 21 Overnight camp participants by gender, mean summary (full sample, N=136)




Figure 23 Overnight camp participants by age, mean summary (full sample, N=136)




Figure 25 Overnight camp participants by race/ethnicity, mean summary (full sample, N=136)




Figure 27 Overnight camp participants by household income, mean summary (full sample, N=136)

When looking at camper demographics, summer day camp participants in 2021 were most likely to be male (50 percent, on average; see Figure 20 and Table 24), 6–9 years old (51

percent, on average; see Figure 22 and Table 26), Caucasian or White (46 percent, on average; see Figure 24 and Table 28), and from middle-income households (53 percent, on average; see Figure 26 and Table 30). Summer overnight camp participants in 2021 were most likely to be female (52 percent, on average; see Figure 21 and Table 25), 10–12 years old (43 percent, on average; see Figure 23 and Table 27), Caucasian or White (61 percent, on average; see Figure 25 and Table 29), and from middle-income households (41 percent, on average; see Figure 27 and Table 31). Regarding campers of diverse abilities, most campers of diverse abilities (if enrolled) were mainstreamed as part of traditional sessions (see Figure 28 and Tables 32 and 33). While day camps most commonly reported serving campers with a cognitive or developmental disability, overnight camps most commonly reported serving camps with a psychological disability.

Two questions (regarding international campers and camper distance traveled) were asked of camps offering any amount of overnight camp programming that were not asked of camps offering any amount of day camp or alternative camp programming. The results of these questions are detailed in Table 34 (international campers) and Figure 29 and Table 35 (camper distance traveled). For-profit camps had the highest number of international campers, on average (3.26), followed by unaffiliated nonprofit camps (1), nonprofit camps affiliated with another entity (0.8), and finally government camps (0). Regarding camper distance traveled to overnight camp, the most commonly reported distance was 100–249 miles, followed by 50–99 miles and 25–59 miles.

When asked about camp capacity and occupancy, on average, summer day camps had 1211.81 available spots, of which 842.33 were filled, resulting in an average of 69.5 percent occupancy overall (see Figure 30 and Table 36). On average, summer overnight camp had 1059.31 available spots, 711.57 of which were filled, resulting in an average of 67.2 percent occupancy overall (see Figure 30 and Table 37). Overall, 70 percent of the camps responding to this survey that offered some amount of day camp programming in 2021 reported that at least some of their 2021 summer day camp population had also attended their summer day camp in 2020 (see Figure 31 and Table 38). Conversely, 64 percent of the camps responding to this survey that offered some amount of overnight camp programming in 2021 reported that none of their 2021 summer overnight camp population had also attended their summer overnight camp in 2020. It is possible that this is influenced by the decreased number of overnight camps that were able to operate in-person programming in 2020 due to early COVID-19 restrictions on summer overnight camp operations.

Figure 20 Day camp participants by gender, mean summary (full sample, N=113)





Figure 24 Day camp participants by race/ethnicity, mean summary (full sample, N=113)



Figure 26 Day camp participants by household income, mean summary (full sample, N=113)



Figure 28 Campers by diverse abilities (full sample)







Figure 31 Camper retention, mean summary (full sample)



FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE




Figure 33 Overnight camp subsidies (full sample, N=136)

Of the camps responding to this survey, both those that ran some amount of day camp programming as well as those that ran some amount of overnight camp programming, about one-third reported subsidizing the cost of summer overnight camp for all campers in summer 2021 (see Figures 32 and 33 and Tables 39 and 40). Only 9 percent of camps that offered some amount of day camp programming and 19 percent of camps that offered some amount of overnight camp programming offered tiered pricing (see Figures 34 and 35 and Tables 41 and 42). Of the camps that offered some amount of day camp programming that also offered tiered pricing, 21–70 percent of their summer day camp campers paid less than the true cost of camp by selecting from tiered prices (see Figure 36 and Table 43). Among the camps that offered some amount of overnight camp programming that also offered tiered pricing, the most commonly reported percent of summer overnight campers who paid less than the true cost of camp by selecting from tiered prices was 51–60 percent (5 camps; see Figure 36 and Table 44).




Figure 38 Overnight camp means-tested financial assistance (full sample, N=135)

Nearly three-fourths (71 percent) of the camps responding to this survey that ran some amount of day camp programming in 2021 and nearly two-thirds (63 percent) of the camps that ran some amount of overnight camp programming in 2021 reported no summer campers received means-tested² financial assistance (See Figures 37 and 38 and Tables 45 and 46).

Still, the total dollar value of means-tested financial assistance was higher, on average, for both day and overnight camps in 2021 compared to the total dollar value in 2020, regardless of programs offered, primary programs offered, or camp owner/sponsor (see Tables 47 and 48).

When asked about the sources of means-tested financial assistance, the most commonly reported sources for camps that offered some amount of day camp programming were internal from one's own camp, followed by external private donations and external foundations (see Figure 39). The most commonly reported sources of means-tested financial assistance among camps that offered some amount of overnight camp programming were internal from one's own network, followed by external foundations and other alternative sources.

Figure 32 Day camp subsidies (full sample, N=112)



Figure 35 Overnight camp tiered pricing (full sample, N=136)



Figure 36 Campers utilizing tiered pricing (full sample)



Figure 37 Day camp means-tested financial assistance (full sample, N=113)





REVENUE PROFILE

The most commonly reported operating revenue among camps responding to this survey was between \$100k and \$499k (26 percent), and the most commonly reported nonoperating revenue in 2021 was less than \$100k (63 percent; see Figure 40). Segmented according to primary programming type, camps that primarily provided overnight camp programming reported both the highest average operating revenues (\$1,808,625.42) as well as the highest average nonoperating revenues (\$327,961.35; see Table 49). Segmented according to camp owner/sponsor, for-profit camps reported the highest average operating revenues (\$2,737,058.10), while nonprofit camps affiliated with another entity reported the highest average nonoperating revenues (\$312,700.13). The most commonly reported total operating budget in a typical year was between \$500k and \$999k (25 percent of camps responding to this survey; see Figure 41 and Table 50).

When asked to provide their 2021 revenue in dollars, by revenue categories, the largest reported revenue source, on average, was overnight camp fees with an average reported revenue of \$785,365.35 (see Figure 42 and Table 51). The next highest revenue source, on average, was day camp fees, with an average reported revenue of \$297,357.80. The smallest revenue source, on average, was campers with diverse abilities fees, with an average reported revenue of \$2,596.46. A mean summary of respondents' 2021 fiscal year revenue by category is detailed in Table 51 by camp segments.

Overall, just over one-third (34 percent) of all camps responding to this survey reported that the level of philanthropic giving in 2021 was about the same as the level of philanthropic giving in 2020, and just over one-third (35 percent) reported that the level of philanthropic giving was slightly more or significantly more than the level of philanthropic giving in 2020 (see Figure 43 and Table 52). Finally, a majority of camps (81 percent) reported that they did not receive any external funding to support a summer feeding program (see Figure 44 and Table 53). Among the 39 camps that did receive summer feeding program funding, the most commonly reported source was the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP)³.

Figure 40 Total 2021 operating and nonoperating revenues (full sample, N=210)






Figure 42 Mean summary of revenue detail by category in dollars (full sample, N=210)





Figure 44 Changes in Philanthropic Giving from 2020 (full sample, N=198)





Figure 45 Summer feeding program funding (full sample, N=202)




EXPENSE PROFILE

The most commonly reported total for operating expenses in 2021 was between \$100k and \$499k (27 percent), and the most commonly reported total nonoperating revenue in 2021 was less than \$100k (73 percent; see Figure 46 and Table 54). Segmented according to primary programming type, camps that primarily provided overnight camp programming reported the highest average operating expenses (\$1.640,819.07), while camps that primarily provided some sort of alternative camp programming reported the highest average nonoperating expenses (\$274,915.10; see Table 54). Segmented according to camp owner/sponsor, for-profit camps reported the highest average operating revenues (\$2,137,553.23) as well as the highest average nonoperating revenues (\$345,970.72). When asked to provide their 2021 expenses in dollars and by expense categories, the largest reported expense source, on average, was wages and salaries for year-round employees (both full and part-time), with an average reported expense total of \$216,198.40 (see Figure 47 and Table 55). The next highest source of expense, on average, was wages and salaries for seasonal employees (both full and part-time), with an average reported expense of \$194,834.40. The smallest expense source, on average, was interest expenses, at \$3,851.54, on average.

Overall, three-fourths (75 percent) of the camps responding to this survey indicated that their camp's total expenses in 2021 increased (slightly or significantly) from 2020 (see Figure 48 and Table 56). Of the 155 camps that reported increased expenses in 2021 compared to 2020, the most commonly reported categories in which camps experienced an increase in expenses were wages/salaries, seasonal employees (123 camps), food and beverage (122 camps), and program and supplies (113 camps; see Figure 49 and Table 57).

Regarding additional COVID-19 expenses, the most commonly reported amount of dollars spent specifically on COVID019 screening and testing supplies and other health and safety products was \$1,001 to \$5,000 (36 percent of camps; see Figure 50 and Table 58). More than half (60 percent) of camps reported experiencing challenges related to food service or supply chain issues (see Figure 51 and Table 59). Finally, when asked to describe the financial stability of their camp, the most common response was "sustainable" (56 percent of camps), followed by "very sustainable" (36 percent of camps; see Figure 52 and Table 60).

Figure 47 Total 2021 operating and nonoperating expenses, in dollars (full sample, N=210)














Figure 55 Future Financial Concerns
